bad art fascinates us there is something at once compelling and troubling about the creative visions of artists who are unwilling or unable to conform to the conventions of their craft but does our interest stem from a sense of schadenfreude an enjoyment of their expressive misfires from a comfortably ironic distance or do we appreciate their unschooled authenticity the author argues that the works of outsider artists such as the shaggs royal robertson daniel johnston and henry darger cannot be understood through familiar debates about irony and sincerity what is often thought to be incompetence may provide us with an essential clue to questions of philosophical and ethical order

this cross disciplinary book situated on the periphery of culture employs humour to better comprehend the arts the outsider and exclusion illuminating the ever changing social landscape the vagaries of taste and limits of political correctness each chapter deals with specific themes and approaches from the construct of outsider and complexity of humour to outsider art and spaces using various theoretical and analytical methods paul clements draws on humour especially from visual arts and culture and to a lesser extent literature film music and performance as a tool of ridicule amongst other discourses employed by the powerful but also as a weapon to satirize them these ambiguous representations vary depending on context often assimilated then reinterpreted in a game of authenticity that is poignant in a world of facsimile and fake news the humour styles of a range of artists are highlighted to reveal the fluidity and diversity of meaning which challenges expectations and at its best offers resistance and crucially a voice for the marginal this book will be of particular interest to scholars in art history cultural studies fine art humour studies and visual culture

texas looms large big skies vast plains large cities the lone star state often inspires a heightened sense of place in its citizens that rivals or surpasses that of new yorkers this is frequently reflected in the art of texas paintings of bluebonnet fields longhorn cattle and scenes from the texas frontier have long enjoyed popularity with collectors outsider artists on the other hand live and create on the fringes of culture and society generally removed from the influence of place they prefer instead to chart their own intensely personal interior landscapes they usually have little awareness of or connection to the mainstream art world or its history and they typically possess limited intention that their work will have an audience or find a place in the broader landscape of art woven through the lives and work of outsider artists is a common thread of isolation this isolation may be psychological cultural socioeconomic geographical racial or institutionally imposed circumstances of life chosen or not have placed these artists apart however these artists like their formally trained peers find that they are compelled to make art it is essential to their lives as a manifestation of their personal histories societal and cultural forces and an unfailing drive to express themselves in outsider art in texas lone stars author jay wehnert takes readers on a visually stunning excursion through the lives and work of eleven outsider artists from texas a state particularly rich in outsider artists of national and international renown

outsider art and folk art have been gaining increasing attention over the past two decades they have been described as the hidden face of contemporary art once marginalised and seen very much as a minority

the outsider art sourcebook is an indispensable guide to the world of outsider art essential for all enthusiasts and collectors in the

field as well as a fascinating introduction to the different facets of the genre

dedicated to expressions of outsider art made in canada aiming to reach and raise awareness with the vastest audience possible outsider art reflects a territory of cultural production that gives credence to creative practices independent of formal training recognized art movements and current trends outsider art is said to exist only because of cultural elitism and class differences where the margins are defined by the center thus outsider artists are dismissed twice first by those who hold status and power and second by the mainstream art world their marginalized social status often due to mental health issues has led to their exclusion from the world of contemporary art this book challenges viewers to relinquish myths and stereotypes about the source of creativity and to embrace the work of self taught creators who are compelled to express themselves in unique ways most importantly they will be asked to consider the role of art institutions in shaping their views on art this volume addresses issues of social justice diversity and inclusion in the art world
