caught in the grip of forces he does not understand a quiet ordinary clerk in algiers commits a murder

an ordinary little man living quietly in algiers commits a pointless murder

the stranger french l'Étranger also published in english as the outsider is a 1942 novella by french author albert camus its theme and outlook are often cited as examples of camus

philosophy absurdism coupled with existentialism though camus personally rejected the latter label the title character is meursault an indifferent french settler in algeria described as a citizen of france domiciled in north africa a man of the mediterranean an homme du midi yet one who hardly partakes of the traditional mediterranean culture weeks after his mother s funeral he kills an arab man in french algiers who was involved in a conflict with one of meursault s neighbors meursault is tried and sentenced to death the story is divided into two parts presenting meursault s first person narrative view before and after the murder respectively meursault learns of the death of his mother who has been living in an old age home in the country he takes time off from work to attend her funeral but he shows no signs of grief or mourning that the people around him expect from someone in his situation when asked if he wishes to view her body he declines and he smokes and drinks regular white coffee not the obligatory black coffee at the vigil held by his mother s coffin the night before the burial most of his comments to the reader at this time are about his observations of the aged attendees at the vigil and funeral which takes place on an unbearably hot day back in algiers meursault encounters marie a former secretary of his firm the two become re acquainted swim together watch a comedy film and begin to have an intimate relationship all of this happens on the day after his mother s funeral over the next few days meursault helps raymond sintès a neighbor and friend who is rumored to be a pimp but says he works in a warehouse to get revenge on a moorish girlfriend he suspects has been accepting gifts and money from another man raymond asks meursault to write a letter inviting the girl over to raymond s apartment solely so that he can have sex with her and then spit in her face and throw her out while he listens to raymond meursault is characteristically unfazed by any feelings of empathy so he does not express concern that raymond s girlfriend would be emotionally hurt by this plan and agrees to write the letter in general meursault considers other people either interesting or annoying or feels nothing for them at all raymond s girlfriend visits him on a sunday morning and the police get involved when he beats her for slapping him after he tries to kick her out he asks meursault to testify that the girlfriend had been unfaithful when he is called to the police station to which meursault agrees ultimately raymond is let off with a warning

a suitable vengeance

with the excitement of a perfectly executed thriller and the force of a parable the stranger is the work of one of the most engaged and intellectually alert writers of the past century albert camus s spare laconic masterpiece about a murder in algeria is famous for having

diagnosed with an almost scientific clarity that condition of reckless alienation and spiritual exhaustion that characterized so much of twentieth century life

often marginalised on the sidelines of both philosophy and literature the works of albert camus have in recent years undergone a renaissance while most readers in either discipline claim camus and his works to be theirs the scholars presented in this volume tend to see him and his works in both philosophy and literature this volume is a collection of critical essays by an international menagerie of camus experts who despite their interpretive differences see camus through both lenses for them he is a novelist essayist who embodies a philosophy that was never fully developed due to his brief life the essays here examine camus s first published novel the stranger from a variety of critical and theoretical perspectives each drawing on the author s knowledge to present the first known critical examination in english as such this volume will shed new light on previous scholarship

camus philosophe to return to our beginnings is the first book on camus to read camus in light of and critical dialogue with subsequent french and european philosophy it argues that while not an academic philosopher albert camus was a philosophe in more profound senses looking back to classical precedents and the engaged french lumières of the 18th century aiming his essays and literary writings at the wider reading public camus criticism of the forms of political theology enshrined in fascist and stalinist regimes singles him out markedly from more recent theological and messianic turns in french thought his defense of classical thought turning around the notions of natural beauty a limit and mesure makes him a singularly relevant figure given today s continuing debates about climate change as well as the way forward for the post marxian left

the contributors to this collection come from disparate fields such as theology literature studies political science and communication studies and are guided by a commitment to consider what we can learn from camus as opposed to where he was wrong or misguided in his life and writing if there is a place to consider the shortcomings of a human being especially one as unique as albert camus it will not be found within this volume the essays in this text are built around the theme that albert camus functions as an implicit philosopher of communication with deep ethical commitments the title creating albert camus is intended to have a double meaning first are those voices who inspired camus and helped create his ideas second are those scholars working with camus s thoughts during and after his life who help create his enduring legacy bringing together scholars who embrace an appreciation of the philosophy of communication provide an opportunity to further situate the work of camus within the communication discipline this new project explores the communicative implications of camus s work

and justice for all arthur chaskalson and the struggle for equality in south africa is a biography of a remarkable life lived in service both to law and to the struggle for social change and justice the social change it describes is the victory over apartheid which was won on several fronts and through the efforts of people in many nations but an important one of those fronts lay in the courts of south africa itself arthur chaskalson enters the historical record in 1963 when he and a team of talented lawyers represented nelson mandela in the historic rivonia trial chaskalson organized legal and non profit organizations and served as the first president of south africa s constitutional court which would eventually lead to the deconstruction of apartheid legislation in exploring his life and career we appreciate more clearly the roles lawyers can play in social change and the achievement of a just social order and at the same time we gain insight into the combination of upbringing experience and character that shapes a man first into a cause lawyer and then into a path breaking and foundation laying judge

what does it mean to describe something or someone as absurd why did absurd philosophy and literature become so popular amidst the violent conflicts and terrors of the mid to late twentieth century is it possible to understand absurdity not as a feature of events but as a psychological posture or stance if so what are the objectives dynamics and repercussions of the absurd stance and in what ways has the absurd stance continued to shape postmodern thought and contemporary culture in rethinking the politics of absurdity matthew h bowker offers a surprising account of absurdity as a widespread endeavor to make parts of

our experience meaningless in the last century he argues fears about subjects destructive desires have combined with fears about rationality in a way that has made the absurd stance seem attractive drawing upon diverse sources from philosophy literature politics psychoanalysis theology and contemporary culture bowker identifies the absurd effort to make aspects of our histories our selves and our public projects meaningless with postmodern revolts against reason and subjectivity weaving together analyses of the work of albert camus georges bataille judith butler emmanuel levinas and others with interview data and popular narratives of apocalypse and survival bowker shows that the absurd stance and the postmodern revolt invite a kind of bargain in which meaning is sacrificed in exchange for the survival of innocence bowker asks us to consider that the very premise of this bargain is false that ethical subjects and healthy communities cannot be created in absurdity instead we must make meaningful even the most shocking losses terrors and destructive powers with which we live bowker's book will be of interest to scholars and practitioners in the fields of political science philosophy literature psychoanalysis sociology and cultural studies

this book is the first english language collection of essays by leading camus scholars from around the world to focus on albert camus place and status as a philosopher amongst philosophers after a thematic introduction the dedicated chapters of part 1 address camus relations with leading philosophers from the ancient greeks to jean paul sartre augustine hume kant diderot nietzsche kierkegaard husserl hegel marx sartre part 2 contains pieces considering philosophical themes in camus works from the absurd in the myth of sisyphus to love in the first man the absurd psychoanalysis justice algeria solidarity and solitude revolution and revolt art asceticism love

about the book albert camus the stranger is not a terribly complicated book it has only a few characters and a simple plot a determined reader could finish it in a single evening the essence of the story is that a young frenchman meursault living in algeria kills a young arab man is tried convicted and sentenced to death the homicide occurs near the middle of the book which is only 123 pages long the actual reason for the killing is somewhat obscure the way the story is told leads one to believe it was misadventure the coast of algiers as seen from the basilica of our lady of africa photo by nilfanion used here under the creative commons attribution 2.0 generic license meursault is revealed to be a somewhat dissolute man not particularly ambitious not particularly talented or interesting in fact he is not particularly anything except self indulgent callous and aloof he is intelligent and likable in a

superficial way but his lack of appreciation for other people renders him shallow all in all the book reads like a well written pulp fiction novel one might conclude that for some existentialists as camus is often said to be the world is dreary and dangerous populated only by the characters from mad men seinfeld and a few zombies i e bureaucrats a fearsome place but happiness is after all a choice a hard choice sometimes but a choice which is to say a discipline it is a challenge one must rise to from that perspective of happiness the book is not so much a study of a person or humanity or even existence as it is a study of a pathological condition meursault suffers from alienation in the most extreme sense he has no particular connection to anyone or anything he isn't merely detached or aloof or stoic or even centered he is not part of society and he's just too lazy to care the book fails as a morality play because it gets us in but does not provide a way out except for death if life is meaningless and absurd and death is the only way out why not get out sooner rather than later that's not much of a lesson the moral of the stranger may very well be to accept life as it is and choose to live it to the fullest but camus doesn't seem to advocate that at least not directly if all we had to judge him by is this book we would have to force ourselves to give him the benefit of the doubt excerpt from the book albert camus 1913 1960 was born in algeria to french parents his life was devoted to writing and the arts he was a journalist editor playwright author essayist actor and a french partisan working with the french resistance during wwii albert camus nobel prize winner half length portrait seated at desk facing left smoking cigarette new york world telegram and the sun newspaper photograph collection see loc gov rr print coll 130 nyw html where the new york world telegram and sun newspaper photograph collection considers all of its photographs public domain although camus became one of france's most famous writers he was raised in poverty he was born to what is known as pied noir parents which is a way of saying camus was part of a lower caste family his father was a farm laborer camus mother catherine hélène sintés a factory worker and cleaning lady was illiterate and deaf she was of spanish descent thus the pied noir designation his father lucien auguste camus was in 1914 killed during wwii at the battle of the marne when albert was a year old buy the book to continue reading

these essays on *l'etranger* celebrate its continuing influence throughout the world contributors come from algeria samoa india russia france britain and the united states included are essays by prominent french and english language authors for whom the novel has been an influential expression of contemporary sensibility other essays include feminist interpretations of meursault studies of camus's narrative form and explorations of the
