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the myth of the twentieth century german der mythus des zwanzigsten jahrhunderts is a 1930 book by alfred rosenberg one of the principal ideologues of the nazi party and editor of the nazi paper volkischer beobachter the titular myth in the special sorelian sense is the myth of blood

which under the sign of the swastika unchains the racial world revolution it is the awakening of the race soul which after long sleep victoriously ends the race chaos the book has been described as one of the two great unread bestsellers of the third reich the other being mein kampf in private adolf hitler said i must insist that rosenberg s the myth of the twentieth century is not to be regarded as an expression of the official doctrine of the party hitler objected to rosenberg s paganism

a fountainhead of fundamental precepts in the field of human history religion and cultural philosophy almost overwhelming in magnitude the myth is the myth of the blood which under the sign of the swastika released the world revolution it is the awakening of the soul of the race which after a period of long slumber victoriously put an end to racial chaos

regarded as the second most important book to come out of nazi germany alfred rosenberg s der mythus des zwanzigsten jahrhunderts is a philosophical and political map which outlines the ideological background to the nazi party and maps out how that party viewed society other races social ordering religion art aesthetics and the structure of the state the mythus to which rosenberg who was also editor of the nazi party newspaper refers was the concept of blood which according to the preface unchains the racial world revolution rosenberg s no hold barred depiction of the history of christianity earned it the accusation that it was anti christian and that unjustified controversy overshadowed the most interesting sections of the book which deal with the world racial situation and the demand for racially homogenous states as the only method to preserve individual world cultures rosenberg was hanged at nuremberg on charges of waging wars of aggression even though he had never served in the military and it is likely that he was hanged purely because of this book

this is the first book length critical analysis in any language of hans blumenberg s theory of myth blumenberg can be regarded as the most important german theorist of myth of the second half of the twentieth century and his work on myth 1979 has resonated across disciplines ranging from literary theory via philosophy religious studies and anthropology to the history and philosophy of science nicholls introduces anglophone readers to blumenberg s biography and to his philosophical contexts he elucidates blumenberg s theory of myth by relating it to three important developments in late nineteenth and early twentieth century german philosophy hermeneutics phenomenology and philosophical anthropology while also comparing blumenberg s ideas with those of other prominent theorists of myth such as vico hume schelling max müller frazer sorel freud cassirer heidegger horkheimer and adorno according to nicholls blumenberg s theory of myth can only be understood in relation to the human sciences since it emerges from a speculative hypothesis concerning the emergence of the earliest human beings for blumenberg myth was originally a cultural adaptation that constituted the human attempt to deal with anxieties concerning the threatening forces of nature by anthropomorphizing those forces into mythic images in the final two chapters blumenberg s theory of myth is placed within the post war political context of west germany through a consideration of blumenberg s exchanges with carl schmitt as well as by analysing unpublished correspondence and parts of the original work of myth manuscript that blumenberg held back from publication nicholls shows that blumenberg s theory of myth also amounted to a reckoning with the legacy of national socialism

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myth in the modern novel imagining the absolute posits a twofold thesis first although modernity is regarded as an era dominated by science and rational thought it has in fact not relinquished the hold of myth a more primitive form of thought which is difficult to reconcile with modern rationality second some of the most important statements as to the reconcilability of myth and modernity are found in the work of certain

prominent novelists this book offers a close examination of the work of eleven writers from the late eighteenth century to the beginning of the twenty first representing german french american czech and swedish literature the analyses of individual novels reveal a variety of intriguing views of myth in modernity and offer an insight into the modernizing transformations myth has undergone when applied in the modern novel the study shows the presence of the subconscious the mythic layer in modern western culture and how this has been dealt with in novelistic literature

rudolf bultmann s controversial program of demythologizing has been the subject of constant debate since it was first announced in 1941 it is widely held that this program indicates bultmann s departure from the dialectical theology he once shared with karl barth in the 1950s barth thus referred to their relationship as that of a whale and an elephant incapable of meaningful communication this study proposes a contrary reading of demythologizing as the hermeneutical fulfillment of dialectical theology on the basis of a reinterpretation of barth s theological project

myths are a central part of our reality but merely debunking them lets us forget why they are created in the first place and why we need them andré fischer draws on key examples from german postwar culture from novelists hans henny jahnn and hubert fichte to sculptor and performance artist joseph beuys and filmmaker werner herzog to show that mythmaking is an indispensable human practice in times of crisis against the background of mythologies based in nineteenth century romanticism and their ideological continuation in nazism fresh forms of mythmaking in the narrative visual and performative arts emerged as an aesthetic paradigm in postwar modernism boldly rewriting the cultural history of an era and setting in transition the aesthetics of mythmaking in german postwar culture counters the predominant narrative of an exclusively rational vergangenheitsbewältigung coming to terms with the past far from being merely reactionary the turn toward myth offered a dimension of existential orientation that had been neglected by other influential aesthetic paradigms of the postwar period fischer s wide ranging transmedia account offers an inclusive perspective on myth beyond storytelling and instead develops mythopoesis as a formal strategy of modernism at large

in an intriguing and provocative book an important thesis an important addition to libraries serving both academic and general readers choice

addressing the question of why many latin american fiction authors are writing about nazism the second world war and the holocaust now this book charts the evolution of latin american literary production from the 19th century through the late 20th century boom to the present day containing texts from mexico colombia brazil argentina and chile it analyses work by some of the most well known contemporary writers including roberto bolaño juan gabriel vásquez jorge volpi lucía puenzo patricio pron and michel laub as well as notable precursors such as jorge

luis borges carlos fuentes and ricardo piglia nazism the second world war and the holocaust in contemporary latin american fiction argues that these authors find nazism relevant to thinking through some of the most urgent contemporary challenges we face from racism to the unequal division of wealth and labour between the global north and south and of course the general failure of democracy to eliminate fascism

frazer's series which attempted to define the shared elements of religious belief and scientific thought discussing fertility rites human sacrifice the dying god the scapegoat and many other symbols and practices whose influences had extended into 20th century culture his thesis is that old religions were fertility cults that revolved around the worship and periodic sacrifice of a sacred king frazer proposed that mankind progresses from magic through religious belief to scientific thought

this volume of the collected works contains essays published by eric voegelin between 1929 and 1933 the period between the publication of his first book on the form of the american mind and hitler's rise to power as well as voegelin's two books analyzing the explosive race issues posed by national socialism the essays herein reflect the intellectual and political tumult of the period and their author's maturing grasp of political reality as he moved away from positivism and kelsen's pure theory of law toward a more refined and open philosophical stance the heart of this shift is signaled by his emphasis on philosophical anthropology and on the decisive importance of the moral substance basic to political communities the topics of the essays are grouped around major themes in sociological theory political science and the theory of law they illuminate the theoretical and practical impact of voegelin's experiences in america as he increasingly engages european theories of state especially the social theories of leading french and german scholars in content these essays include such pragmatic concerns as american theories of property economic transactions due process of law and austrian constitutional reforms book jacket
