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utopia and dystopia in tolkien s legendarium explores how tolkien s works speak to many modern people s utopian desires despite

the overwhelming dominance of dystopian literature in the twentieth and twenty first centuries it also examines how tolkien s malevolent societies in his legendarium have the unique ability to capture the fears and doubts that many people sense about the trajectory of modern society tolkien s works do this by creating utopian and dystopian longing while also rejecting the stilted conventions of most literary utopias and dystopias utopia and dystopia in tolkien s legendarium traces these utopian and dystopian motifs through a variety of tolkien s works including the hobbit the lord of the rings the silmarillion book of lost tales leaf by niggole and some of his early poetry the book analyzes tolkien s ideal and evil societies from a variety of angles political and literary theory the sources of tolkien s narratives the influence of environmentalism and catholic social doctrine tolkien s theories about and use of myth and finally the relationship between tolkien s politics and his theories of leadership the book s epilogue looks at tolkien s works compared to popular culture adaptations of his legendarium

j r r tolkien s novels of middle earth the hobbit the lord of the rings trilogy and the silmarillion have become some of the most famous and most beloved literary works of the twentieth century and the lord of the rings films by director peter jackson have reignited interest in tolkien and his works as well as introduced his stories to a new generation of fans even if you ve never read the novels and have only seen the films you know that the world of middle earth is a complicated one tolkien took great care in representing this world from creating new languages to including very particular cultural details that add to the richness of the world s fabric many other books have been written about tolkien and his works but none have come close to providing the kind of reference needed to comprehend the world of middle earth that s what veteran dummies author and unabashed tolkien fan greg harvey attempts to do in the origins of tolkien s middle earth for dummies as the author says in his introduction to the book this is not an encyclopedia or quick guide to all the diverse beings languages and history that make up tolkien s middle earth nor is it a set of plot outlines for the novels rather what you ll find in the origins of tolkien s middle earth for dummies is a basic guide to some of the possible linguistic and mythological origins of middle earth plus a rudimentary analysis of its many themes and lessons for our world this book can help enrich your reading or re reading of tolkien s novels and it will challenge you to think about the themes inherent in tolkien s middle earth and their implications in your own life here s just a sampling of the topics you ll find covered in the origins of tolkien s middle earth for dummies exploring the main themes in tolkien s works including immortality and death the heroic quest love fate and free will and faith and redemption investigating the diverse lands of middle earth including the shire gondor and mordor and their significance examining the different cultures of middle earth such as hobbits elves men and those wily

when the lord of the rings was published in the 1950 s it did not sit comfortably among any preconceived notions of literary genre the critical responses reflected the confusion for some it was an unwelcome reappearance of narrative standards that modernism was supposed to have done away with or just a bad novel others considered it a refreshing work in the epic and romance traditions ironically much of the critical prejudice regarding the question of genre in the lord of the rings has been motivated by the same kind of blindness that tolkien denounced in his famous 1936 lecture beowulf the monsters and the critics like beowulf tolkien s work has also failed to be properly appreciated and assessed due to a general refusal to accept the centrality of monsters because despite its monstrous originality and fantastic setting it is very clearly and not only chronologically at the centre of twentieth century literature the lord of the rings and the western narrative tradition is an attempt to account for the particular genre interaction that governs tolkien s tale and put it in a meaningful relationship with the contemporary literary context at the same time it is a quest to track down one of the most famous and elusive literary monsters of the past century by filling out a long neglected white space on the map of comparative literature and genre criticism

epic romances fearsome dragons and alien worlds lie between the pages of this volume containing more than 35 stories from the early masters of fantasy literature the narratives here transport the reader to alternate worlds where magic abounds cosmic terrors lie around the corner and intrepid heroes fight for justice drawing inspiration from norse japanese and chinese mythology as well as from traditional fairytales and modern fears the authors collected here span the breadth of the genre including tales from william morris h g wells robert e howard and h p lovecraft amongst others they demonstrate the plethora of imaginative literature that was written in the late 19th and early 20th centuries many of these tales were foundational works bringing ideas of the supernatural into the mainstream and through their efforts creating entirely new genres before tolkien there were many writers embracing the realm of fantastic fiction the man responsible for its origin was george macdonald 1824 1905 a calvinist minister and celtic scholar who wrote the first true fantasy novel he was followed by a number of imaginative successors at the end of the 19th century including h g wells arthur machen and ernest bramah after the end of world war i the pulp magazines opened up the genre to a new generation of writers particularly h p lovecraft and robert e howard who provided exciting magical and horrifying tales that fascinated a multitude of readers by the outbreak of world war ii the outlines of the fantasy genre had been sketched out by these pioneers and an entirely new type of fiction had been created this collection includes stories by robert e howard h p lovecraft g g pendarves h g wells william morris lafcadio hearn abraham merritt arthur machen ernest bramah robert w chambers george macdonald

includes chapters on l frank baum and ursula le guin with material on washington irving edgar allan poe herman melville nathaniel hawthorne edgar rice burroughs james branch cabell h p lovecraft ray bradbury edward eager and james thurber among others

on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the new kalevala thirty experts on comparative epic research from 12 countries met in turku finland in august 1999 to debate the role of the finnish national epic and its scientific significance as material for comparison they used textualised epics from europe and epic traditions some of them still preserved in oral form from america africa central and southern asia a special look was taken at the baltic finnish and baltic epics the kalevala the kalevipoeg the setu peko and the lativan lacplesis which all share certain ideological strands the cooperation between fieldworkers documenting living oral epics and
