native americans practice some of america s most spiritually profound historically resilient and ethically demanding religions joel martin draws his narrative from folk stories rituals and even landscapes to trace the development of native american religion from ancient burial mounds through interactions with european conquerors and missionaries and on to the modern day rebirth of ancient rites and beliefs the book depicts the major cornerstones of american indian history and religion the vast movements for pan indian renewal the formation of the native american church in 1919 the passage of the native american graves and repatriation act of 1990 and key political actions involving sacred sites in the 1980s and 90s martin explores the close links between religion and native american culture and history legendary chiefs like osceola and tecumseh led their tribes in resistance movements against the european invaders inspired by prophets like the shawnee tenskwatawa and the mohawk coocoochee catharine brown herself a convert founded a school for cherokee women and converted dozens of her people to christianity their stories along with those of dozens of other men and women from noblewarriors to celebrated authors are masterfully woven into this vivid wide ranging survey of native american history and religion

presents the history of the native american religions starting from their roots as tribal religions and then details the detrimental effects of european colonization the annihilation of the native americans that threatened the religions and

their restoration in the 20th 20th century

for longer than five centuries native americans have struggled to adapt to colonialism missionization and government control policies this first comprehensive survey of prophetic movements in native north america tells how religious leaders blended indigenous beliefs with christianity s prophetic traditions to respond to those challenges lee irwin gathers a

scattered literature to provide a single volume overview that depicts american indians creative synthesis of their own religious beliefs and practices with a variety of christian theological ideas and moral teachings he traces continuities in the prophetic tradition from eighteenth century delaware prophets to western dream dance visionaries showing that native american prophecy was not merely borrowed from christianity but emerged from an interweaving of christian and ancient north american teachings integral to native religions from the highly assimilated ideas of the puget sound shakers to such resistance movements as that of the shawnee prophet irwin tells how the integration of non native beliefs with prophetic teachings gave rise to diverse ethnotheologies with unique features he surveys the beliefs and practices of the nation to which each prophet belonged then describes his or her life and teachings the codification of those teachings and the impact they had on both the community and the history of native religions key hard to find primary texts are included in an appendix an introduction to an important strand within the rich tapestry of native religions coming down from above shows the remarkable responsiveness of those beliefs to historical events it is an unprecedented encyclopedic sourcebook for anyone interested in the roots of native theology

this collaborative work represents a pathbreaking exercise in native american theology while observing traditional categories of christian systematic theology creation deity christology etc each of these is reimagined consistent with native experience values and worldview at the same time the authors introduce new categories from native thought worlds such as the trickster eraser of boundaries symbol of ambiguity and land finally the authors address issues facing native americans today including racism poverty stereotyping cultural appropriation and religious freedom from publisher s description

the power of religion to preserve individual and group identity is perhaps nowhere more evident than among native american peoples in becoming and remaining a people howard harrod shows how the oral traditions and ritual practices of northern plains indians developed how they were transformed at critical points in their history and how they provided

them with crucial means of establishing and maintaining their respective identities this book offers a bold new interpretation of anthropological studies demonstrating how religious traditions and ritual processes became sources of group and individual identity for many people harrod reconstructs the long religious development of two village peoples the mandans and the hidatsas describing how their oral traditions enabled them to reinterpret their experiences as circumstances changed he then shows how these and other groups on the northern plains remained distinct peoples in the face of increased interactions with euro americans other indians and the new religion of christianity harrod proposes that other interpretations of culture change may fail to come to terms with the role that religion plays in motivating both cultural conservatism and social change for northern plains peoples religion was at the heart of social identity and thus resisted change but religion was also the source of creative reinterpretation which produced culture change viewed from within the group such change often seemed natural and was understood as an elaboration of traditions having roots in a deeper shared past in addition to demonstrating religious continuity and change among the mandans and the hidatsas he also describes instances of religious and social transformation among the peoples who became the crows and the cheyennes becoming and remaining a people adopts a challenging analytical approach that draws on the author s creative interpretations of rituals and oral traditions by enabling us to understand the relation of religion both to the construction of social identity and to the interpretation of social change it reveals the richness depth and cultural complexity of both past native american people and their contemporary successors

quest for harmony provides a basic understanding of the cultures and spiritual teachings of four native american nations lenape delaware ani yun wiya cherokee lakota sioux and dine navajo the text is always sympathetic respectful and when

possible presented in the voices of native americans each nation is described in terms of its name traditional location s present population language and traditional social organization at least one story of origin is provided for each nation followed by a survey of its history from earliest documented times until recent times at the heart of each chapter the spiritual worldview and rituals of the nation being discussed are introduced with sections on cosmology gods and spirits rituals and other issues particular to that nation critical issues common to native americans such as the pannational spiritual movements and the environment are also covered quest for harmony makes clear that not only are native american spiritual traditions very much alive they are also in the midst of a dramatic revival

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
