female writers of her time experienced the social changes and the adoption of a new view of the woman first hand as a young woman she first came in contact with the women s rights movement in britain which later influenced her work to a great extent more recently in light of the first and second wave feminism her work has been interpreted as showing early forms of feminist thinking angela carter born more than half a century later in 1940 is known for her openly feminist writing that presents familiar stories and themes with a twist on gender and class issues⁶ her novels and short stories are often set in the past and explore the issues of identity for women from the light of the first and second wave feminism during the 1970s and 1980s
