shakespeare s adolescents examines the varied representation of adolescent characters in shakespeare s plays using early modern medical knowledge and an understanding of contemporary theatrical practices the book unpacks complexities that surrounded the cultural and theatrical representations of signs associated with an individual s physical maturation each chapter explores the implications of different signs of puberty in verbal cues facial adornments vocal traits and body sizes to illuminate how shakespeare presents vibrant adolescent selves and stories by analysing female and male puberty together in its discussion of adolescence shakespeare s adolescents provides fresh insight into the age based symmetry of early modern adolescent identities the book uses the adolescent s state of transformation to illuminate how the unfixed nature of adolescence was valued in early modern culture and through shakespeare s celebrated characters and actors

impossible desire and the limits of knowledge in renaissance poetry examines the limits of embodiment knowledge and representation at a disregarded nexus the erotic carpe diem poem in early modern england these macabre seductions offer no compliments or promises but instead focus on the lovers anticipated decline and quite stunningly given

the reformation context humanity's relegation not to a christian afterlife but to a marvellian desert of vast eternity in this way a poetic trope whose classical form was an expression of pragmatic epicureanism became during the religious upheaval of the reformation an unlikely but effective vehicle for articulating religious doubt its ambitions were thus largely philosophical and came to incorporate investigations into the nature of matter time and poetic representation renaissance seduction poets invited their auditors to participate in a dangerous intellectual game one whose primary interest was expanding the limits of knowledge the book theorizes how renaissance lyric's own fragile relationship to materiality and time and its self-conscious relationship to making positioned it to grapple with these impossible metaphysical and representational problems although attentive to poetics the book also challenges the commonplace view that the erotic invitation is exclusively a lyrical mode *carpe diem*'s revival in post reformation europe portends its radicalization as debates between man and maid are dramatized in disputes between abstractions like chastity and material facts like death offered here is thus a theoretical reconsideration of the generic parameters and aspirations of the *carpe diem* trope wherein questions about embodiment and knowledge are also investigations into the potentialities of literary form

in boys abducted abdulhamit arvas explores the history of abducted boys in english and ottoman literary and visual culture to examine the relationships between homoeroticism race and empire in the early modern period the popular literary trope of the abducted beautiful boy often eroticized as an exotic object of desire intersects with the historical phenomenon of vulnerable youths who were captured and exchanged within the global traffic in bodies arvas offers a queer historicist analysis of a wide array of ottoman and english texts and genres ranging from poetry drama and travelogue to chronicles maps and visual arts he shows how the boy in these representations crosses boundaries between nations and empires embodying the tensions and dissonances between the aestheticized eroticism of literary and cultural representations and the violent history of abductions conversions and enslavements in so doing arvas presents complex parallels and connections between the two societies highlighting the circulation of sexual and racial discourses in imperial imaginings to uncover discursive formations and formulations of sexuality race and empire

thinking through place on the early modern english stage argues that environment and embodied thought continually shaped one another in the performance of early modern english drama it demonstrates this first by establishing how characters think through their surroundings not only how they orient themselves within unfamiliar or otherwise strange locations but also how their environs function as the scaffolding for perception memory and other forms of embodied thought it then contends that these moments of

thinking through place theorise and thematise the work that playgoers undertook in reimagining the stage as the setting of the dramatic fiction by tracing the relationship between these two registers of thought in such plays as the malcontent dido queen of carthage tamburlaine king lear the knight of the burning pestle and bartholomew fair this book shows that drama makes visible the often invisible means by which embodied subjects acquire a sense of their surroundings it also reveals how in doing so theatre altered the way that playgoers perceived experienced and imagined place in early modern england

this wide ranging collection reflects on the various motivations that caused the folio to come into being in 1623 7 years after shakespeare s death and on how the now iconic book has been continually reimagined after its initial publication to the present day in honour of its original publication shakespeare s first folio 1623 2023 text and afterlives brings together a remarkable set of ground breaking essays by an international group of scholars from the beginning the publication that came to be called the first folio was defined by the tension between the book as text and the book as a material object in this volume the individual contributions move between these two meanings in that they consider precursors to the first folio in the form of reader assembled volumes the poetic identity of shakespeare and how misfortunes and successes in the early modern printing house shaped shakespeare s text chapters examine the unpredictable and often surprising subsequent histories of the book that has even been given a sacred status and become the basis of shakespeare s unique position in the history of literature they consider the afterlife of the text in relation to the reception of shakespeare s first folio in spain its presence in and influence on james joyce s ulysses the role that meisei university of japan s shakespeare collection has played in the education and research of the institution and what the collection of 82 copies at the folger shakespeare library in washington dc tells us about the ongoing role of these books within the study of shakespeare and the early modern period
