all the associated impacts that fragment and threaten to create collapse among the systems that created and sustain us there are the related economic and social impacts the fragmentation of communities and political ideologies through attitude polarisation and the increasing threats to systems by those who seek to promote further exploitation at the expense of attempts to regain some system of cooperation and an attitude of compassion which is at the heart of our survival strategies as a species philosophy has always sought to address questions related both to our place in the universe and to how to live given our understanding of our place those of us committed to a philosophical life have used a range of metaphors and narratives to enlighten and to exhort to action those who would seek to understand what to do how and why philosophy has played a key role in helping us as a species to respond to the ecological emergency what then is the practice of philosophy given that we're in an ecological emergency this question is the thread and it forms the framework for the dialogue that runs through the book

boundaries borders and margins are related concepts and realities and each of these can be conceptualized and organized in closed or open ways with degrees of closure or openness the logics of stasis and closure as well as cults of exclusivist and exclusionary sovereignty are reflected and embodied in the closed xenophobic conceptualization and organization of boundaries borders and margins but an open conceptualization of the borderlands where mixing and hybridity take place at a rapid even dizzying pace gives rise to creolization at the threshold of sovereignties which can also be imagined at present our border zones are spaces of anxiety ridden security arrangements violence and death the existing politics of boundary maintenance is wedded to a cult of sovereignty at various levels which produces bare lives bodies and lands we need the new art of border crossing to be defined by the notion of camaraderie and shared sovereignties and non sovereignties border zones can also be zones of meetings communication transcendence and festive celebration of the limits of our identities thus we need a new art and politics of boundary transmutation transformation and transcendence in the broadest possible sense that entails the production of spatial scalar somatic cognitive affective and spiritual transitions

at columbia university in 1906 william james gave a highly confrontational speech to the american philosophical association apa he ignored the technical philosophical questions the audience had gathered to discuss and instead addressed the topic of human energy tramping on the rules of academic decorum james invoked the work of amateurs read testimonials on the benefits of yoga and alcohol and concluded by urging his listeners to take up this psychological and physiological problem what was the goal of this unusual speech rather than an oddity francesca bordogna asserts that the apa address was emblematic it was just one of many gestures that james employed as he plowed through the barriers between academic popular and pseudoscience as well as the newly emergent

borders between the study of philosophy psychology and the science of man bordogna reveals that james s trespassing of boundaries was an essential element of a broader intellectual and social project by crisscrossing divides she argues james imagined a new social configuration of knowledge a better society and a new vision of the human self as the academy moves toward an increasingly interdisciplinary future william james at the boundaries reintroduces readers to a seminal influence on the way knowledge is pursued

are animals capable of wonder can they be said to possess language and reason what can animals teach us about how to live well how can they help us to see the limitations of human civilization is it possible to draw firm distinctions between humans and animals and how might asking and answering questions like these lead us to rethink human animal relations in an age of catastrophic ecological destruction in this accessible and engaging book matthew calarco explores key issues in the philosophy of animals and their significance for our contemporary world he leads readers on a spirited tour of historical and contemporary philosophy ranging from plato to donna haraway and from the cynics to the jains calarco unearths surprising insights about animals from a number of philosophers while also underscoring ways in which the philosophical tradition has failed to challenge the dogma of human centeredness along the way he indicates how mainstream western philosophy is both complemented and challenged by non western traditions and noncanonical theories about animals throughout calarco uses examples from contemporary culture to illustrate how philosophical theories about animals are deeply relevant to our lives today the boundaries of human nature shows readers why philosophy can help transform not just the way we think about animals but also how we interact with them

argues for a concept of justice that takes account of boundaries institutions and human diversity

this anthology consists of fourteen topically arranged essays that explore a form of humanism characterized by epistemic humility a progressive ethical orientation as well as a respect for the positive features of religion according to recent polls more americans find themselves uncomfortable maintaining traditional religious beliefs and moral commitments a trend driven in large part by the millennials and one likely to continue with subsequent generations as a professor who has regular interactions with students of this generation the author has discovered that those who neither wish to affiliate with one particular religious tradition or community as perhaps their parents and grandparents did nor drop religion altogether fear that there are few if any truly attractive alternatives alternatives that would help them find meaning offer sound moral guidance and navigate life s most challenging times this book in part aims to show that both meaning and resources for crafting a philosophically sound moral compass can be found outside the sacred canopy these essays however are also the outcome of the author s own journey from mainline protestant christianity to secular humanism the primary catalyst for this transition was the onset of a serious autoimmune illness which forced him to confront various issues in philosophy of religion particularly the problem of suffering and evil this autobiographical component is

woven into several chapters with the intention of showing that in a postmodern milieu we can no longer attribute major worldview shifts to solitary dispassionate rational inquiry although essays have been composed in such a way that each may stand alone a feature of the book that allows readers to approach chapters in any order they choose they nevertheless have been arranged into four sections that reflect the author s personal journey major topics include 1 chronic illness and the death of god 2 epistemic limitations and respect for persons 3 a humanist approach to reading the bible and 4 advantages of ethical reasoning without god

religion within the boundaries of mere reason is a key element of the system of philosophy which kant introduced with his critique of pure reason and a work of major importance in the history of western religious thought it represents a great philosopher s attempt to spell out the form and content of a type of religion that would be grounded in moral reason and would meet the needs of ethical life it includes sharply critical and boldly constructive discussions on topics not often treated by philosophers including such traditional theological concepts as original sin and the salvation or justification of a sinner and the idea of the proper role of a church this volume presents it and three short essays that illuminate it in new translations by allen wood and george di giovanni with an introduction by robert merrihew adams that locates it in its historical and philosophical context
